NOTES FROM TIM: Greetings all. Trust Council on Saturna was very busy, with several new business items sponsored by individual Trustees. These included resolutions for advocacy on freighter anchorages, ocean plastics and micro plastics, and the potential for a secretariat role for Islands Trust in the Howe Sound Forum. The most newsworthy item was the decision for the Islands Trust to take a very public stand against the Trans Mountain Pipeline, including a national media campaign involving both traditional and emerging media.

We received a report on the Model Strategy for Antenna Systems, which will be available for implementation by Local Trust Committees, regarding siting and other concerns over new cell phone and other communication towers.

The next meeting of our Local Trust Committee is Mon., July 23rd. Please consider attending if you can, and, as always, please feel free to contact your Trustees with your questions, comments, or concerns.

REGIONAL DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Summer's here, time to join the social whirl of markets and visitors. Let's remember to be courteous and patient with our crowded ferries and increased traffic. Remember to drive slowly to reduce dust and danger to pedestrians and cyclists. Take your time and be considerate of your neighbors please.

June was a busy month with many meetings. The dinner at Gwen Bigsby's which brought together the full Fire Department was a great start. Chief Richard Carlson was able to tell the full complement (Firefighters, Dispatchers and First Responders) of the necessity for training and record keeping. We must document every action to comply with Work Safe BC regulations, and get our Firefighters certified if we are to retain Regional District support for our Fire Department. As ever, new volunteers would be very appreciated by our long serving heroes.

The weekend of June 16/17th saw the Annual General Meetings of both LIAS and the Last Resort Society.

LIAS retains the same board, except Vic Lacey, who retired. Many thanks to Vic for his years of service, and the rest of the Board for keeping on and dealing with all it takes to keep this remarkable system going! Of course all praise goes to the incredibly hard working Larry Manahan, without whom LIAS could not do what it does for so many of us. The "Connect the Coast" fibre optic system is still in the planning stages, so time will tell how that all pans out.

The Last Resort AGM followed, with Melinda Auerbach presenting the financial realities that will put a referendum question on the ballot this October asking if we are willing to pay more taxes to support the maintenance of our beautiful Judith Fisher Health Centre. I know any tax increase suggestion is unpopular, but the reality is now we've built it we should support it. This was a visionary project and I will suggest the community will grow into it. Having a secure source of annual funding will free the incredibly hard working Board to do something other than fundraise 24/7. I saw the wish list on the wall at the meeting so responded with my weed whacker, and spending two hot and tiring mornings taming the encroaching alders and blackberries graphically showed me the need for a regular yard maintenance position.

The Public Information meeting on the plans for our Recycling Centre and Free Store on June 18th was well attended. Mike Wall, the RD's Facility Manager, came with two of the Talk Trash Team, and Dale, the Sunshine Recycling Manager who runs the rest of the Regional District's recycling centers. Both Mike and Dale were able to answer people's questions, and share expertise with our

local contractor. I want to thank Robin Jacobs, Sam Bain and Tom Carter for negotiating on behalf of the landlords, The Magic Mountain Land Co-op. The plan went through six iterations before agreement was achieved, and I am optimistic that the agreed upon plan will serve us for several years. Work should start sometime this summer, and hopefully be complete by year end.

In closing I will announce that I will stand again in October to carry on as your Regional Director. The past term has had a lot of controversy, believing that perseverance furthers I ask for your vote on Oct. 20th. See you around,

This month I thought I would provide some information on obtaining prescription refills. Recently I have had a number of people contacting me requesting refills. In order to obtain a medication refill you have a couple of options available to you. You can always call your physician's office and make an appointment to see your doctor to obtain the refill. If you are a patient of Dr. McClure's you will need to see him in a clinic, either in Parksville or on Lasqueti. If it is a stable condition and you have seen Dr. McClure within the past year, then you can see me at the Judith Fisher Centre during my clinic hours and I can review your medication requests and consult with Dr. McClure. Prescriptions may then be faxed to your pharmacy. Note that the College of Physicians and Surgeons does not allow for phoned-in prescriptions. It is always best to plan ahead so that you are not without needed medications. ♥ Dianne

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

A group of people of like age were sitting on Dazy's deck and tossing around their ideas for ageing out on Lasqueti. That was 2002 and the Lasqueti Last Resort Society (LLRS) was born to make sure that "something" was available on island to make that possible. Turned out that a lot of effort was required: deciding what ageing out looked like; learning how to express that as a zoning bylaw; and securing a parcel of land. When the Magic Mountain Land Co-op was willing to donate a hectare of land, Laurence Fisher was asked if he would like to have the land named after him. He said NO, however it did work to name it after his mother.

The Judith Fisher Centre is the parcel of land that has the health centre building, the Alan Greene elder cottage, the services building, the garden and the generator/wood shed located on it. Hopefully, this clears up any name confusion that you may have.

LLRS's vision has always included a health facility that would provide health services for the entire island population. After having moved the nursing clinic a few times, it was time to have a permanent place for the nurse to practice. It also made sense to have that facility in close proximity to the elder housing.

MAJOR OVERHAUL

The Recycling Information Open House on June 18th at the Judith Fisher Centre was successful and folks were in favour of the upgrades to the Recycling Centre and Free Store. The facility upgrades are needed in order for Lasqueti to produce clean recyclable materials that will be able to find an end market. The upgrades will also accommodate the collection of materials for local use for upcycling or other innovative and environmentally responsible endeavours.

Site clean-up/preparation begins July 9th at our Recycling Depot/Free Store. The Free Store will stay open while the Recycling Depot closes from the end of day July 8th to

potentially December 2018. This means that the only things that can be dropped off are: clean re-usable clothes and household items and refundable bottles.

This is the time to reduce what we bring to Lasqueti, since everyone will be responsible for storing, or taking their recycling off island. Below are some suggestions for the interim:

Buy less. Zen and the Art of using less.

Leave packaging at point of purchase. This way you deal with it once. Stores are obliged to take the packaging that their products produce.

Encorp's Parksville Bottle and Recycling Depot, 611A Alberti Hwy. Open 7 days a week, 8am - 6pm. 250-248-0224

Qualicum Bottle and Recycling, Unit 4-141 4th Ave., Qualicum. Open Mon. to Sat. 9am to 5pm. 250-752-8884

Transfer Station, 860 Church Rd., Parksville. Open 7 days a week, 8am-5pm. Closed statutory holidays. Garbage (Residual), yard waste, construction and demo material and clean recyclables. For residents of Nanaimo Regional District. Some fees may apply. 250-390-4111

The Third Annual Lasqueti Styrofoam Day will be in August. Stay tuned for the date. Bike or carpool to Squitty Bay Park. Bring drinking water, good footwear and gloves. Be ready to roll up your sleeves for a daunting but worthwhile task. Dump Fees: July dump days are Sat., July 6th and 21st from 1:00pm-3:00pm. These are the first dump days with paid fees; \$5/bag or \$25/truckload, cash only. "If you don't show up with money I will be turning you away!" Robyn, our Waste Manager says. Remember: the dump does not accept compost or other biodegradable matter like cardboard. Also, no dumping of foam, hazardous material, nor recyclable items.

Recycling news: more packaging materials can now be recycled. They can be taken to the Parksville Bottle Recycling Depot. Coffee bags, chip bags, zip lock bags and more. https://recyclebc.ca/ has details and the list of other depots.

We pay into CPP and EI. This might not seem like a big thing to some, but to our employees it means that in the slower winter months they could potentially collect employment insurance, which would make living full time on Lasqueti much more realistic. And for those employees looking to get a loan or a mortgage at some point, having proof of income makes this task much easier.


